

## **Baptism of the Lord**

11 January 2015

#### Jean Béliveau and the Lay Vocation

God calls each of us to follow Him in a particular way. Some are called to religious or priestly vocations; others to marriage; others to the single life. Those of us who are laypeople sometimes don't realize that this is also a vocation and not just what's left over if you don't have "a calling," In fact, the role of the laity is fundamental to the life of the Church.

An excellent example of the role of laypeople in the Church is Jean Béliveau, who passed away last month. Archbishop Christian Lépine captured some of this in his homily at Mr. Béliveau's funeral:

For several days we have been remembering Jean Béliveau, his passion and integrity, his dignity and humanity, which he displayed on as well as off the ice. We recall how, year after year, he personified consideration for others in his relationships: with his friends, his teammates, Canadiens supporters, hockey fans, and the general public. We remember the foundation that he established after his retirement to benefit children, more specifically, those with disabilities. We are reminded that faith was of great importance to him and that he prioritized family life in his decision making.

Mr. Béliveau lived a balanced life that included family, friends, and outstanding personal achievements. Because of his fame, he became somewhat of an icon. Yet much of what he achieved can be accomplished by those who never laced up a pair of skates. Here are some ways we can learn from Jean Béliveau how to live the lay vocation well:

- 1. Maintain your relationship with God. Pray. Go to Mass. Everything else follows.
- 2. Be faithful to your marriage, your friends, your team, and your business commitments. Jean Béliveau personified integrity.
- 3. Identify your talents and interests and develop them. These are gifts from God that point towards His unique plan for you.
- 4. Be kind. Be the person who makes time for others but has no time for gossip or meanness.
- 5. Be attentive. God calls us in various ways over time. Retirement was just the beginning for Jean Béliveau!

Rick Sarkisian, author of *Lifework: Finding Your Purpose in Life*, sums it up, "We are also called to play a unique role in the story of salvation; we each have a special mission in life. This is our life's work – the specific use of God-given skills, talents, and virtues in serving Him within the home, the Church, and the world."

May we be attentive to God's call and live our vocations faithfully.
