## **Second Sunday of Lent**

March 16, 2014

### **Spiritual Works of Mercy**

The children in our *Fides Quaerens Intellectum* program are studying the virtue of Mercy this month. Mercy is at the heart and soul of the Lenten season. Jesus Christ, crucified, is the ultimate expression of God's mercy and the most fitting focus of our prayer and meditation during this holy season of Lent.

Of the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy, the Spiritual are less well known: Admonish the sinner; instruct the ignorant; counsel the doubtful; comfort the sorrowful; bear wrongs patiently; forgive all injuries; pray for the living and the dead. These works require considerable personal commitment. If you Google the "Spiritual Works of Mercy," you will find no end of people who can't wait to admonish sinners, instruct the ignorant and counsel the doubtful. But hold on! Remember the splinter in our neighbor's eye and the plank in our own. The catch is to perform these works with mercy and love.

It is truly merciful to reach out to the sinner, the ignorant and the doubtful, but to do so requires a certain spiritual discipline and maturity, something we can work on especially during Lent. In our culture, the very notion of sin is disputed but, as Christians, we have a responsibility to ourselves and our neighbors to acknowledge that sin very much exists. Identifying sin begins with our individual selves and our own sinfulness. When we acknowledge our own sins – those occasions when we put ourselves ahead of God or neighbor – we have taken the first step toward reconciliation and spiritual maturity. It is only after we have reconciled with God that we have the integrity to "admonish sinners." Likewise, we need to know our faith well – a lifelong exercise – so that we might instruct those who do not. And we need to cultivate a living relationship with Christ in order to confidently counsel those who doubt.

Unfortunately, our society is very *laissez-faire*, to say the least, and we are surrounded by all sorts of ignorance and depravity – where to begin? Having acknowledged our own sinfulness, and aware that all sin separates us from God and therefore hurts us, we reach out to the sinner, the ignorant and the doubtful with love and compassion, as a parent, brother or sister or a friend, precisely because they are unconscious of their need for admonition, instruction or counsel. We should not go hunting and pecking at every perceived infraction of the laws of God, but neither should we look the other way when presented with someone in need of His mercy. Sin and ignorance and doubt threaten our eternal life, and it is no kindness to leave someone there simply out of fear of embarrassment or hurt feelings.

As fellow sinners, we can empathize with those who have made bad choices, but as Christians, we can also offer them our experience of mercy and forgiveness through Christ and His Church. When we do, we can expect to comfort the sorrowful, bear wrongs with patience and forgive injury. It is not a painless process. We need only look to Jesus on the Cross to see the price of mercy. Nevertheless, with His grace, there is much that we can accomplish.

The last of the Spiritual Works of Mercy is to pray for the living and the dead, too often neglected. This is something we all can do, from little children to the most elderly. Let us practice the Spiritual Works of Mercy and help each other get to heaven!
