Almsgiving: A Double-Sided Coin

The third of our Lenten disciplines is almsgiving. Most of us are generous; we readily contribute to many causes and volunteer for different organizations. Jesus, however, is asking for more; He is asking that we give not only from our plenty but also of ourselves. His remarks with regards the widow's offering confirm this:

[Jesus] looked up and saw rich people putting their gifts into the treasury; he also saw a poor widow put in two small copper coins. He said, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all of them; for all of them have contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty has put in all she had to live on." (Luke 21: 1-4)

If we look honestly at our almsgiving, most of us would probably agree that we rarely give out of our poverty. True almsgiving involves sacrifice, and sacrifice takes us out of our comfort zone. What is asked of us seems unreasonable. God does not want us to go without. He does, however, call us to go with less, so that He may fill our needs. This demands that we trust in God's providential care.

This call to dependency, to neediness, is countercultural. God calls us to go against societal norms and to admit our poverty: "For you have no delight in sacrifice; if I were to give a burnt offering, you would not be pleased. The sacrifice acceptable to God is a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise (Psalm 51: 16-17). Sacrifice requires humility.

The enemy of true sacrifice is pride. Pride prevents us from moving out of self towards God. The whole point of giving is to empty ourselves so that we may receive grace upon grace from our Risen Lord. It is in our need that God comes to us.

True almsgiving is not that difficult an undertaking. One family I met would go out once a month for a meal together. During Lent, they skipped the meal and donated the money they would have spent to a local food bank. The time they would have spent at the restaurant was put to use at a parish event. These little sacrifices create compassionate hearts and strengthen the bonds within our families, parishes and larger communities.

Our Lady of the Annunciation is a perfect model of giving and receiving. Mary gave all she had to God. Paradoxically, her poverty of spirit – her self-emptying - allowed her to be generous beyond measure and thus provide God with the space to fulfill His desire for her and for mankind. And she received Him fully, in the flesh!

May our Lenten sacrifices make room for Jesus. May they challenge us to love more deeply, uniting ourselves with Christ Crucified, so as to rise with Him in glory this Easter.
