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

Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

8 February 2015



On this, the twenty-third World Day of the Sick, begun by Saint John Paul II, I turn to all of you who are burdened by illness and are united in various ways to the flesh of the suffering Christ, as well as to you, professionals and volunteers in the field of health care.

This year's theme invites us to reflect on a phrase from the Book of Job: "I was eyes to the blind, and feet to the lame" (*Job* 29:15).

How many Christians show, not by their words but by lives rooted in a genuine faith, that they are "eyes to the blind" and "feet to the lame"! They are close to the sick in need of constant care and help in washing, dressing and eating. This service, especially when it is protracted, can become tiring and burdensome. It is relatively easy to help someone for a few days but it is difficult to look after a person for months or even years, in some cases when he or she is no longer capable of expressing gratitude. And yet, what a great path of sanctification this is! In those difficult moments we can rely in a special way on the closeness of the Lord, and we become a special means of support for the Church's mission.

Time spent with the sick is holy time. It is a way of praising God who conforms us to the image of his Son, who "came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (*Mt* 20:28). Jesus himself said: "I am among you as one who serves" (*Lk* 22:27).

With lively faith let us ask the Holy Spirit to grant us the grace to appreciate the value of our often unspoken willingness to spend time with these sisters and brothers who, thanks to our closeness and affection, feel more loved and comforted.

SECOND COLLECTION THIS WEEK: Our second collection this week will go to our parish's Helping Others Fund.

WORLD DAY OF THE SICK: In recognition of World Day of the Sick, Father Robert will offer the sacrament of Anointing of the Sick following Mass next week, February 14th and 15th. If you are facing serious illness such as diabetes or cancer, or if you are experiencing the frailty of old age, you are encouraged to receive this sacrament of healing.

SHROVE TUESDAY PANCAKE SUPPER: Lent is just around the corner and we will be sharing in our traditional Pancake Supper on Tuesday, February 17th from 5:30 pm to 8:00 pm. There are many variants of this tradition, which is the last fling before the austerity of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, but basically, we are gobbling up our meats and sweets before the season of fast and abstinence. As in previous years, the whole family is invited, older siblings, grandparents etc... and arrival time is flexible. REMINDER: Please bring a non-perishable food item which will be donated to MultiCaf, a food bank and soup kitchen servicing the Côte-des-Neiges area. Items may be left in the boxes as you enter the Parish Hall.

ASH WEDNESDAY: Wednesday, February 18th marks the beginning of Lent. In addition to the Mass at 8:30AM, there will be a Mass at 7:00PM. There will be distribution of ashes at both Masses. On Ash Wednesday, Catholics over 14 years of age are expected to abstain from eating meat. Catholics 18 years of age and up to the beginning of their 60th year (not including pregnant or nursing mothers) are expected to fast: taking only one full meal and two other light meals, eating nothing between meals. We are also to abstain from meat on Fridays throughout Lent.

DONATIONS FOR THE HOMELESS: At the initiative of a couple of Loyola High School students, a new collection for the homeless is now taking place. We have set up a donation box at the main entrance of the church to gather items of clothing that many people without shelter need. Many homeless people especially need clothes like socks and mittens, hats and even boots (these expensive items are hard to come by for the homeless) and not so much big jackets. The items that we will be donating will change each season as needs arise. This box will be emptied every two weeks and sent to the Salvation Army. We appreciate all your support on this new project for our church. Thank you.
